Jesus Christ Is the Same: Yesterday, Today and Forever. (Heb. 13:8)

While their name, "The Piano Guys" might seem a bit misleading, it is a musical group consisting of one piano guy and one cello guy (the public performers) and two other guys who work behind the scenes. In my opinion, their music is both entertaining and inspiring. They masterfully blend diverse, seemingly disconnected and antagonistic styles of music, from classical masterpieces to contemporary pop music, into symphonic and uplifting works that entertain audiences, both young and old. As men, deeply rooted in their faith, their work strives through various media (including music videos) to demonstrate that music, despite its diversity, is beautiful and can be recognized as such by everyone; because it has its unifying source in and is reflective of God.

One of their on-going projects is called the "Wonders of the World" series in which they play and record at various natural and man-made Wonders of the World. To date they have performed at four of the seven on their list: 1) the Great Wall of China, 2) Christ the Redeemer Statue in Rio de Janeiro and the Iguazu Falls on the border of Brazil and Argentina, 3) the Mayan City at Chichen Itza, Mexico and 4) the ancient city of Petra in Jordan (made popular in the movie, *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade*.) One of my favorite music-videos of their work is from this series, their composition filmed in Brazil. The Piano Guys shared their reflections and the story of its recording. "We've set an ambitious goal to film in front of all Seven Wonders of the World. We started with the Great Wall of China.

of As our tour Brazil approached, we set our sights on our next Wonder: Christ the Redeemer. This incredible piece of art soars 10 stories in the air, stretches 100 feet wide weighs million and 1.4pounds (630,000 kg). But even more impressive is that it was built in the 1920's on a peak of a sheer 2,300 ft. (700 meter) overlooking Rio Janeiro. Not far from this inspiring statue are the Iguazu Falls – a natural Wonder of



the World. Made up of 275 waterfalls that stretch across 1.7 miles (2.7 km), to match the amount of water that flows down these falls you would need 2 million people to each pour a quart of water every second. As we considered what piece of music would be worthy of such incomparable locations, we looked to songs that have been composed or used to praise Jesus Christ, for whom the statue was built and who billions believe created all the natural wonders of this world. We wanted to combine the melody of the heartfelt hymn of praise "How Great Thou Art" with one of the most beautiful melodies ever written — the theme from the movie "The Mission" ("Gabriel's Oboe.") "The Mission" is a movie that powerfully depicts the lives of men that lay down their lives for others. ... The two harmonize so beautifully with each other, both musically and thematically. As we played these pieces in front of the Christ Statue and Iguazu Falls we felt an overwhelming sense of wonder, peace, and joy." (https://hrexach.wordpress.com/2014/11/12/at-the-end-of-the-day-the-piano-guys-the-mission) During one of their concerts which I attended, I remember being deeply moved by Steven Sharp Nelson (cellist) when he introduced their performance of this piece reflecting further on his personal experience. He expressed how incredibly humbled he felt playing in the presence of the massive Cristo Redentor statue, as he felt a part of the great homage the human family made to God by completing this seemingly impossible task and testimony of faith in Jesus. His sincerity was evident, but then he paused. He got emotional and as his voice cracked he told the audience that nothing prepared him for what he experienced at the Iguaza Falls. As they approached, he was full of tremendous awe and a

deep serenity as he realized that no matter how great our monuments to God may be ... none could compare to those that He had created out of love for us. These Falls were one of God's gifts to us as a sign of His love for us.

For one hundred years, Saint Andrew School has striven to impart the Good News of Jesus Christ ... "building a culture of Life and a civilization of Love through Faith and Knowledge." You and I are part of this glorious history ... memories of the past ... dreams of a better future ... daily building ... slowly and faithfully ... in the present moment our own local Wonder of the World that will impact the lives of our students in this world and in the hereafter. We may be tempted by the pragmatism of our age, the current state of the national or global economy or the demographics of our locale to think that such a task is not practical nor worth it or worse we may conclude that it will not serve us; but Jesus Christ is the same: yesterday, today and forever and His message is an assurance that He is with us. As Catholics and as Church, we must accept the responsibility of our vocation to follow in His footsteps and continue to announce the Good News of the Light of the world in the midst of the darkness, chaos and division attempting to snuff Him out. Like the builders of those ancient "Wonders of the World," who building on their past and dreaming of a better future (not so much for themselves, but for their children and their children's children) began to build things that they probably never saw fully realized in their lives, we too commit ourselves for Christ's sake to build something wonderful for God and for those who come after us. While the builders of these earlier "Wonders" shared their gifts for crafting stone into something that would touch deeply the lives of generations, or the Piano Guys who combing

their musical knowledge and talent and their technological abilities to spread a message of unity and encouragement to entertain and inspire, we are called today to behold in awe the wonder of Saint Andrew School and make a choice. No, I am not referring merely to the buildings and facilities, and the many programs; but to the thousands of individual souls-students, teachers, parents, parishioners and benefactors-each broken and imperfect; yet, each called by Christ to the life of grace through the message of encouragement His Good News brings. We all have our personal litanies of Saint Andrew School from Father McShain to Sister Roberta, and all our teachers and friends and classmates; some have already preceded us into eternity and others are still here to encourage and support us. This is Saint Andrew School and what makes this awesome task both relevant and necessary in every generation. Archbishop Charles Chaput states my point more clearly: "We were made by God to receive love ourselves, and to show it to others-love anchored in the truth about the human person and the nature of human relationships. That's our purpose. That's why we were created. We're here to bear one another's burdens, to sacrifice ourselves for the needs of others, and to live a witness of Christian love – in all our public actions, including every one of our social, economic and political choices; but beginning with the conversion of our own hearts. Every such life is the seed of a dozen others and

begins a renewal of the world." (my emphasis) [Archbishop Charles J. Chaput, *Strangers in a Strange Land; Living the Catholic Faith in a Post-Christian World* (New York: Henry Holt & Co, 2017) 245-46.] If we simply look at this shared task from a worldly view, we may agree with the cynics in their fear of



the impact of demographics and economy. But, if we approach our responsibility in awe and reverence, then we will see meaning to our mission that transcends the limits of both time and space.

In *The Letter to the Hebrews*, its author's "message of encouragement," (13:22) is more than a personal reflection, but an authentic testimony and proclamation that Jesus is the culmination of God's word to humanity and the fulfillment of "the Father's loving design" and His plan of salvation. In his many



references to the Jewish faith that would make sense to his audience, the author reminds the early Hebrew converts that "Just as the infidelity of the people thwarted Moses' efforts to save them, so the infidelity of any Christian may thwart God's plan in Christ." (3:6-4:13) Thus, despite the vicissitudes of the human heart, there is an inescapable responsibility of believers to freely accept and cooperate with the abiding faithfulness of God's gracious gifts to reap their full benefits. This message is as cogent and relevant to us today, as it was to its original readers as it has been and will be throughout all of salvation history; because the principle of our very existence is JESUS CHRIST, "the same yesterday, today and forever." While this may seem like a "pie in the sky after you die" theology; it certainly is not. Rooting our existence in Christ Jesus, the Eternal Word of God, of whom St. John writes, "All things came to be through Him, and without Him nothing came to be "(Jn. 1: 3-4); is the foundation of immersing ourselves in the

loving design of the Creator and opening ourselves up to the redemptive action of His Presence in Truth and Charity. Contemporary society is chock full of hucksters selling "quick-fixes" to every woe: Do this and make thousands of dollars; buy this and lose 50 pounds; eat, drink, breathe, contort ... in this way and your problem (whatever it might be) will be gone. Blather and empty promises about the easy-street way of achieving anything worthwhile; however, only thrust us deeper into discouragement, loneliness and alienation. Whereas, freely receiving the life of Christ into our own brokenness is the Good News that promises us the Cross of Jesus, which embraced in imitation of Him will result in resurrection. Our faith is a message of encouragement amidst the chaos of this fallen world reminding us that God does not require from us anything that He Himself has not already done ... not for Himself, but for us and our salvation. In short, the proclamation of this "message of encouragement" is the on-going mission of the Church's evangelization, the operating principle of Catholic education and the hallmark of Saint Andrew School. Will you help us to continue building this Wonder of the World for the next generation? Will you be a seed from which a dozen more are made to renew the world in Christ?

In the words of Saint Mother Teresa of Kolkata (formerly, Calcutta): "Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We have only today. Let us begin."

From the Principal

Reflecting on the impact of Saint Andrew School over its hundred years of existence I've been drawn to listen to Miranda Lambert's song, The House that Built Me. The song is the tale of a woman who returns to her childhood home to recall memories held in each part of the house. The visit helps her to remember who she is. The lyrics, "If I could just come in, I swear I'll leave with nothing but a memory of the house that built me" sum up the need to go back in time every now and again.



As principal, I've had the pleasure of meeting many alumni who return to see the school. Proudly, I share the improvements that have been made to their elementary school. It's the same school; but not the same old school. In turn the alumni share stories of their formative years. I've heard some fantastic tales. The most surprising story was from the gentleman who confessed to climbing on the roof to get a better shot at the girls' schoolyard. If I recall correctly, the boys were dumping water on the girls. I remember thanking the Lord I wasn't his principal!

On these tours it is pure delight to hear the laughter as folks reminisce about their years at SAS. It is easy to see the camaraderie of classmates, some who have not seen or heard from one another for years. Most recently, the Class of 1968 toured the school. After they left, I felt so much support for continuing the mission of building a culture of Life and a civilization of Love. These were good folks who had survived the trials and tribulations of life. The few moments of walking the halls of SAS helped these men and women remember who they were. They were genuinely happy about reuniting with one another. It seemed as if the years just slipped away and they were as kids again in the schoolyard.

From its inception in 1922, Saint Andrew School has strived to form students in faith and knowledge. What I know of the early years of SAS is mostly gleaned from historical accounts. However, I learned not to long ago that I grew up knowing two of the early (1940's) Saint Andrew School graduates; Mr. Daniel Comly and Mr. James Mullen. Both men raised their families in our neighboring parish. Their children are dear friends of mine. Both are remembered as faith filled men of great integrity, very much devoted to God, family and service. I am certain there are many others like them who went on to build a better world for those they knew and loved.

For one hundred years Saint Andrew School students have impacted their respective communities. My greatest reward is connecting with my former students and knowing of their success. I have been blessed with the knowledge of that so many still value Catholic education. Your support of the Annual School Appeal gives evidence of that.

Gymnasium Building Campaign

Updates:

- Despite exceeding the minimum 'funds on hand' requirement to begin construction, the Archdiocese recently changed the 'funds on hand' requirement to begin capital projects from 50% to 75% in order to reduce (\$) & shorten (years) long-term mortgage obligations. This decision will requires the parish to raise another \$500,000 before we begin construction.
- In the meantime, we will continue pre-construction activity including soil testing, design and variance requests with municipal authorities.
- We will be pursuing grant opportunities with Catholic Foundations that support capital projects of this nature.

Sisters of St. Joseph

Their history in the United States began in 1836 when Mother Saint John Fontbonne sent six sisters to St. Louis, Missouri. The Sisters of St. Joseph spread throughout the United States and into Canada. In 1847, Mother Saint John Fournier left St. Louis for Philadelphia. She, along with other sisters, provided care at St. John's Orphanage for Boys. With the help of Bishop John Neumann, the sisters began the first novitiate and academy in McSherrystown, Pennsylvania in 1854. They purchased the Middleton family home in 1858 which continues to be the current administrative center in Philadelphia. This was also the first site of Mount Saint Joseph Academy.

The Sisters of St. Joseph cared for orphans and widows, educated catechists and nursed the wounded during the Civil War. They cared for families in their homes during the Influenza Epidemic of 1918.

Deeply spiritual, fearless, knowledgeable and kind – this is the caliber of women who answered the call to come to Drexel Hill and begin a 100 year legacy. Father McShain asked four sisters from Our Lady of the Rosary parish to come to St. Andrew Parish and provide religious instruction to the parish children. These early catechists were Sister Agnes Gonzaga, Sister Bernadine, Sister Agnita, and Sister Marie James.

...the end of an era. Father McShain's admiration for these sisters was evident at the dedication Mass of the School and Chapel on August 27, 1922. "After the coming of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, no greater blessing could come to the parish than the arrival of the Sisters..."

We have been blessed by the faithfulness of the Sisters of St. Joseph for the past 100 years. Father McShain's words all those years ago, still ring in our hearts today. Sadly, this wonderful legacy will come to an end at the conclusion of this current school year. The St. Andrew Community has been blessed by your presence and the contributions of all the Sisters that have faithfully served our school.



Qualified charitable distributions from your IRA reduce your taxable income

You cannot keep retirement funds in your account indefinitely. You generally have to start taking withdrawals from your traditional IRA, SIMPLE IRA, SEP IRA or retirement plan account when you reach age 70½ (see footnote). These withdrawals are taxable as ordinary income!

Using the IRS's "Uniform Lifetime Table," there is a required minimum distribution (RMDs) that must be taken annually – and that disbursement from your IRA account(s) is taxed as ordinary income. Not only can these RMDs push some retirees into a higher marginal tax bracket, these RMDs can also impact taxes on Social Security and Medicare. For example:

• Since RMDs are treated as taxable ordinary income, they increase the taxpayers modified adjusted gross income (MAGI). The chart below illustrates the additional 3.8% Medicare surtax should the RMD increase your MAGI beyond the single or married brackets.

- RMDs can also impact Social Security Benefits. If you file a federal tax return as an "individual" and your combined income is between \$25,000 and \$34,000, you may have to pay income tax on up to 50% of your benefits. If more than \$34,000, up to 85 percent of your benefits may be taxable. For a joint return, and you and your spouse have a combined income that is between \$32,000 and \$44,000, you may have to pay income tax on up to 50 percent of your benefits. If more than \$44,000, up to 85 percent of your benefits may be taxable.
- Medicare Part B and D premiums are calculated using a taxpayer's MAGI from the prior tax year.
 So large RMDs can cause sharp increases to your Medicare costs, with high income taxpayers paying up to 80% of the cost.

You can avoid these additional taxes by directing your RMD to a qualified charity (like Saint Andrew School). Several donors to our Annual Appeal have directed their RMDs to Saint Andrew School, supporting one of their favorite causes while saving taxes as outlined above. Qualified charitable distributions do not provide a charitable deduction for taxpayers – the check is sent directly from the IRA custodian to the charity.

Tax benefits when using a Qualified Charitable Distribution to donate to charity

QCDs can provide sizable tax savings as tax rates on regular ordinary income are usually the highest. If you don't benefit from itemizing your tax deductions and are of age, then QCDs could be a good option. Since the standard deduction will be \$12,950 for single filers and \$25,900 for married couples, filing jointly in 2022, and with the State and Local Tax (SALT) currently capped at \$10,000, it's not easy to benefit from itemizing given the high standard deductions available for singles and married couples.

Footnote: The Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 (SECURE Act) became law on December 20, 2019. The Secure Act made major changes to the RMD rules. If you reached the age of 70½ in 2019 the prior rule applies, and you must take your first RMD by April 1, 2020. If you reach age 70½ in 2020 or later you must take your first RMD by April 1 of the year after you reach 72.
