


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"DO NOT FORGET YOUR PURPOSE AND DESTINY AS GOD'S CREATURE." [St. Francis of Assisi]


St. Francis of Assisi is quoted as saying: "Keep a clear eye towards life's end. Do not forget your purpose and destiny as God's creatures. What you are in His sight is what you are—and nothing more. Remember that when you leave this earth, you can take nothing that you have received ... but only what you have given; a full heart enriched by honest service, love, sacrifice and courage." (my emphasis) Such words express the soul of a person whose priorities are properly ordered: God, understanding one's relationship with God, and fulfilling one's destiny in time and eternity by accepting and living in accord with the loving design of the Creator. St. Francis' capacity to embrace the fullness of reality was rooted in His faith in the God of Love who created all that is; but, who particularly created human beings in His own image and likeness endowing them with the capacity to love (capax Dei) ... the very life of God Himself.

In an interview that was published in "The Saturday Evening Post" (26 October 1929), Albert Einstein stated: "Imagination and creativity are more important than knowledge." Two years later in his book, Cosmic Religion and Other Opinions and





Aphorisms (originally published in 1931 by Covici-Friede, Inc. in New York), he asserted the same thesis: "At times I feel certain I am right while not knowing the reason. When the eclipse of 1919 confirmed my intuition, I was not in the least surprised. In fact, I would have been astonished had it turned out otherwise. Imagination is more important than knowledge. For knowledge is limited, whereas imagination embraces the entire world, stimulating progress, giving birth to evolution. It is, strictly speaking, a real factor in scientific research." The genius Einstein's intellectual prowess is eclipsed by his humility. In submitting his gifts to the transcendent "more" of existence, he allows himself the freedom not to be limited by his own experience, and opens his mind to a greater reality that may not always be readily categorized by human knowledge. Allow me to share part of a Positive Words Research Blog post titled, "Child Imagination and Creativity are Infinite and Genius." The authors write: "One of the main concerns of many parents [and educators] is that their children spend a significant amount of time in front of screens, whether it is TV, tablet, or smartphones. Spending most of your time in front of screens is an artificial form of learning. When a child concentrates on the visual and auditory objects for learning, they stop using their imaginations and don't work on creating something new. ... Children learn creativity and imagination by engaging their whole body and getting involved in their environment. Children express themselves through verbal and non-verbal play, and when they use their large and small muscles as well as their senses while playing, that helps them develop healthy and robust brain connections." Long before Einstein lived or the Positive Words Research existed, Jesus preached the same message which is the foundation of the mission of Catholic Education. For a century, under the guidance of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Saint Andrew School has been committed to this truth by instilling in its students that through both FAITH AND KNOWLEDGE (Fides et Scientia) and not knowledge alone, we are given the capacity to transform the world by building a culture of Life and a civilization of Love. Practically speaking (if that is possible when speaking about imagination), imagination allows human beings to transcend the "details" of their own personal experience and self-expression of it to understand it in the context of the shared "human" experience across the globe and the centuries. In other words, imagination allows human beings to accept their individuality positively, not as something that is divisive, and celebrate it as it finds its fullest meaning expressed in the human nature created in God's "image

and likeness" that unites us and makes us all equal. As diverse and personal as imagination is to each individual, it is dynamically oriented toward unity, giving individuals the capacity to create masterpieces in art, literature, music, etc. that touch the most profound depths of our humanity with emotion and passion. The development of imagination assists children to actually use the gifts of intellect and will: to solve problems, confront difficulties prudently and to form a moral sensitivity in decision making.

In the first published volume of his *Chronicles of Narnia*, C. S. Lewis artfully uses his imagination to weave the narrative of the salvation of the world into a masterful piece of children's (or adult's) literature.

In LWW (The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe) there is a confrontation between the White Witch and Aslan. She comes to claim the life of Edmund because he has turned traitor. She appeals to a deep magic from the beginning of time saying that "Every traitor belongs to me as my lawful prey" and that "for every treachery I have a right to kill." Aslan and the White Witch talk privately, and Aslan declares Edmund free from the witch's claim. But the look of joy on the witch's face as she departs, and her allusion to a promise Aslan has made, indicate that something ominous is about to happen. Late that night, Aslan leaves the camp "head hung low" and walking slowly. As Lucy and Susan watch from a distance in horror and disbelief, the witch and all manner of evil creatures bind Aslan to the Stone Table, shave him, and muzzle him. Finally, the witch takes a stone knife and kills Aslan. Exhausted by grief, Lucy and Susan wait for morning. As the sun rises, they hear a loud crack and see the Stone Table broken in two. But there is no Aslan. ... Aslan is alive! He is real, not a ghost. He licks Susan's forehead. The girls are overjoyed and throw themselves on him, kissing him repeatedly. When they calm down, Susan asks: "But what does it all mean?" "It means," said Aslan, "that though the witch knew the Deep Magic, there is a magic deeper still which she did not know. Her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of Time. But if she could have looked a little farther back, into the stillness and the darkness before Time dawned... She would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack and Death itself would start working backwards." Just as Aslan was killed in Edmund's stead and saved his life, so Jesus' death for us not only takes away our guilt for what



we have done or left undone, but when we believe in Him, new life begins to transform us from the inside out, from death to life that will go on for all eternity.

Catholic Education is modelled on the life of the world's greatest Lover narrating and living the greatest love story ever told. You would think that it would be the easiest thing to accept, right? Not so. Genuine Love is not a human reality, because Love is the very nature of God, yet, we are invited by Jesus "to remain in [His] love." (Jn 15: 9) As human beings, we are privileged to participate in the Divine life, because as St. John writes: "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God. Whoever is without love does not know God, for God is love. In this way the love of God was revealed to us: God sent His only Son into the world so that we



might have life through Him. In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son as expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also must love one another. ... [I]f we love one another, God remains in us, and His love is brought to perfection in us." (1 Jn 4: 7-12) God loves us because of who He is, not because of what we do in response to His love. Twenty years ago, in his World Youth Day Homily in Toronto (28 July 2002), Pope St. John Paul II prophetically explained: "On a hillside near the lake of Galilee, Jesus' disciples listened to His gentle and urgent voice; as gentle as the landscape of Galilee itself,

as urgent as a call to choose between life and death, between truth and falsehood. The Lord spoke words of life that would echo forever in the hearts of His followers. ... Listen to the voice of Jesus in the depths of your hearts! His words tell you who you are as Christians. They tell you what you must do to remain in His love. ... The 'spirit of the world' offers many false illusions and parodies of happiness. There is perhaps no darkness deeper than the darkness that enters young people's souls when false prophets extinguish in them the light of faith and hope and love. The greatest deception, and the deepest source of unhappiness, is the illusion of finding life by excluding God, of finding freedom by excluding moral truths and personal responsibility. The Lord is calling you to choose between these two voices competing for your souls. ... The world you are inheriting is a world which desperately needs a new sense of brotherhood and human solidarity. It is a world which needs to be touched and healed by the beauty and richness of God's love. It needs witnesses to that love."

The need for authentic Catholic Schools in our world is as great as it has ever been. Thus, the perennial challenge before Saint Andrew School, in order to equip them for life in this world, is to teach in word and deed: "not to forget their purpose and destiny as God's creature"; to remain faithful in witnessing to Almighty God, who created us in His own image and likeness and loves us unconditionally; "to keep our eyes focused on eternal life" and how our choices in the here-and-now create it; and to provide opportunities "to die to self" so that we may present to God, the gift He seeks ... "a full heart enriched by honest service, love, sacrifice and courage." Is there anything more valuable in which we might invest our own time, energy and financial resources than in providing our children with the fundamental tools and a Catholic imagination to engage this world with its myriad of temptations and empty promises? The only remaining stain glass window from the original 1922 structure. It can be viewed above the Foss Avenue entrance door of the 1952 school addition.





- The Upper Darby Zoning Board approved our request for zoning variances with minor modifications at the April 26th Zoning Board meeting.
- At the June13th, Upper Darby Planning Commission Meeting, the Commission approved our land use plans and will recommend approval to the Upper Darby Township Council.
- On July 19th, an appeal of the UD Zoning Board's decision was filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Delaware County by two Foss Avenue families. Have not received the Zoning Board's response and no court date has been set as of this writing.
























Yet another record year for Financial Aid for the 2022-2023 School year



Individuals are now able to make a donation to the Foundation for Catholic Education's Special Purpose Entity (SPE) and **get 90% of it back** in the form of a PA tax credit which reduces your 2022 PA Income Tax obligation.

It's worth repeating - <u>you make a donation and get 90% of it back!</u> For the upcoming 2022-2023 school year, Saint Andrew School will award <u>\$240,630</u> in financial aid through these SPE programs thanks to our loyal donors and supporters of SAS.



In this \$1,000 donation example, donor receives K-1 form from Foundation in late February / early March 2023 displaying a \$900 tax credit. \$900 is entered on line 23 of your PA tax return, reducing your tax liability by \$900. If you already paid your 2022 taxes through payroll withholding, you would be entitled to a refund from PA.

- This SPE requires a two-year commitment to earn the 90% tax credit (for both the 2022 & 2023 tax years).
- Participation eligibility requires taxable income from a for-profit company. If a married couple has one spouse working for a non-profit and the other spouse working for a for-profit, they are eligible to participate at their total combined income level.
- ➤ With the minimum donation level at \$1,000, annual taxable PA income should be at least \$35,000.

Lifeline Scholarship Program

June 21, 2022, Harrisburg, Pa. — The Pennsylvania Senate Education Committee approved a bill to extend Lifeline Scholarships to students in underperforming school districts. <u>House Bill 2169</u>, sponsored by Reps. Clint Owlett and Martina White, would offer scholarships to public school students in the bottom 15 percent of lowest-performing schools. On April 27, 2022, the Pennsylvania House passed the Lifeline Scholarship bill <u>104-98</u>.

"For the first time in history, the Pennsylvania House approved legislation that would empower parents with education funding that follows students to the schools of their choice," Senior Vice President of the Commonwealth Foundation Nathan Benefield said. "The Pennsylvania Senate now has the opportunity to take the next step and ensure every child has access to an excellent education."

Lifeline Scholarships would give students in the lowest-performing public schools a modest portion of the per-pupil education funding to use on educational expenses, such as tuition, curriculum, and tutoring. <u>Eighty percent</u> of students in the bottom 15 percent of schools are non-white and economically disadvantaged.

"An excellent education is the pathway to success later in life, giving students the opportunity for greater independence," Benefield said. "No student should be trapped in a failing school just because of their zip code. Lifeline Scholarships provide education opportunities to the families that need it most."

While Lifeline Scholarships will provide students with around \$6,800 of flexible education spending, close to two-thirds of the \$19,900 per student spent on public schools will remain with the school district.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) program is a common religious experience involving children and adults in which the religious values of childhood, primarily those values of contemplation and enjoyment of God, are predominant. This experience is shared in a place particularly prepared for the religious life of children called the Atrium.

The CGS is the result of a long period of careful observation of children by Sofia Cavalletti and her Montessori collaborator, Gianna Gobbi, in Rome. Sofia Cavalletti was a Catholic laywoman and theologian who received a doctorate in Hebrew and Comparative Semitic Languages from La Sapienza University in Rome and who was a biblical scholar. A mutual friend introduced Sofia to Montessori educator, Gianna Gobbi, who was well acquainted with the young child since she had been with children in the classroom for 15 years. She was also aware of Maria Montessori's religious work and the use of materials designed for children to help them better understand the Catholic liturgy. The first materials that Gianna brought to Sofia were a small model altar and articles used at Mass. Sofia and Gianna noted the joy the children expressed even at their "awkward efforts." It was enough of an impetus for them to continue their work and observation of children in a prepared environment called "the atrium" to better learn of the spiritual nature and religious potential. From that day to the present time, Sofia and Gianna remind us constantly to look to the child for that sign of a deeply religious life – joy – and to always ask the question: "What face of God is the child telling us he or she needs to see?"

CGS has grown and spread to more than 65 countries. In the United States, there are over 2,500 members and 220 adult formation courses. There are over 150 formation leaders recognized by our association to offer these courses. The United States has over 3,750 atria. Within the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, however, there are only seven parishes that offer The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program:

- Our Mother of Consolation (Philadelphia)
- St. Agnes (West Chester)
- Saint Andrew School (Drexel Hill)
- St. Genevieve (Flourtown)
- St. Joseph (Spring City)
- St. Marie Goretti (Hatfield)
- St. Raymond of Penafort (Philadelphia)

SAS is the only parochial or regional Catholic school in Delaware County that offers this remarkable program to our children in PK, Kindergarten and 1st grade.

SAS - Catechesis of the Good Shepherd - The Atrium

The atrium (or prepared environment) is one of the important elements that helps the relationship between God and the child to flourish. After a theme has been presented, the child is free to choose an activity that will make possible the inner dialogue with the "Interior Teacher." How does the atrium help to nourish this relationship? ~ The atrium can be compared to a retreat house facilitating recollection and silence. ~ The atrium is a place for religious life, for community and worship—not a classroom for instruction. ~ The atrium is a place of meaningful work through which the child can have a conversation with God. ~ The atrium was the place in the early church where the catechumens were prepared. For the child, too, the atrium is a place of preparation for involvement in the larger worship community.

I hope to work with you all again! Enjoy the show!!






