Pastor's Annual Message

November 2021

Dear sisters and brothers,

"For God, who said: 'Let light shine out of darkness,' has shone in our hearts to bring to light the knowledge of the glory of God on the face of Jesus Christ. But we hold this treasure in earthen vessels that the surpassing power may be of God and not from us. We are afflicted in every way, but not constrained; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our body. For we, who live, are constantly being given up to death for the sake of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may be manifested in our mortal flesh." (II Cor 4: 6-11)



In accord with the old Book of Rituals, when a priest had a new chalice crafted and prior to its use in the sacred liturgy, it needed to be consecrated by a bishop. After the appropriate prayers were said, the bishop would first anoint the inside of the cup with Sacred Chrism and then take his ring and slide it along the inside of the cup, intentionally scratching a mark on the surface (to the horror of the young man if he didn't know that was part of the Rite). The purpose was to remind the priest that the dignity of the chalice was rooted in what it was created to contain, namely the Precious Blood of our Lord, not the worth of the material(s) from which it was made. And, more importantly, it was a daily reminder that God entrusted the Divine Nature (*capax Dei*), the capacity to love into the lives of flawed and imperfect human beings to the greater glory of God; upon which St. Paul so beautifully reflects in his second epistle to the Church of Corinth.

This annual message allows me to remind myself and all of you of the "treasure" which we have received from Almighty God as individual parishioners and corporately as the family of faith at St. Andrew the Apostle Parish. Despite the many challenges and the adversity that we may face in life or the burden of our own failures, sinfulness and unworthiness. our Catholic Faith teaches that God does not cancel us, but He Himself, in His mercy, bends down to raise us up. He always willingly accepts a humble and contrite heart. It is into these fragile and imperfect "earthen vessels" of our humanity that He willingly and trustingly pours out the fullness of His Divine life, over and again. Over and against the howling and faceless *spirit of the age* that wants us to believe that everything is flawed, broken and thus, beyond repair (which, my friends, is the oldest LIE in the Book); we unapologetically believe that "God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life," (Jn. 3: 16) resisting the temptation to commit the primordial sin of believing the hissing deception of a fallen creature over and above the Truth of God's Word. What an awesome blessing for those courageous enough to accept His invitation to live according to His loving Design!

In this Annual Report, I present to you an account of our "sacrifice of praise" our return of love to Love. And while it may be limited and imperfect and our aspirations unmet, nonetheless, we present humbly to the Lord, the "divine treasure" that He has entrusted to our care in the earthen vessels of our lives. Moreover, we recommit ourselves to a grateful and generous stewardship of our gifts "manifesting the life of the Risen Jesus in our lives by carrying the dying of Jesus in our hearts." As we pray at Holy Mass: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give You thanks, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Christ our Lord." Accept my gratitude for all you do to make St. Andrew the Apostle Parish a prayerful, grateful, generous and blessed family of faith.

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

The Sacrament of **Baptism** is joyfully celebrated on the second and fourth Sunday of each month following at 1:30 pm in the church.

The word baptism in its origins is Greek and means "immersion" and "bath." Immersion in water is a sign of death and emersion out of the water means new life. To bathe in water is also to undergo cleansing. Saint Paul sums up this truth when he says, "You were buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead" (Col 2:12).

The origin and foundation of Christian Baptism is Jesus. Before starting his public ministry, Jesus submitted himself to the baptism given by John the Baptist. The waters did not purify him; he cleansed the waters. Jesus' immersion in the water is a sign for all human beings of the need to die to themselves to do God's will. Jesus did not need to be baptized because he was totally faithful to the will of his Father and free from sin. However, he wanted to show his solidarity with human beings in order to reconcile them to the Father.

By commanding his disciples to baptize all nations, he established the means by which people would die to sin—Original and actual—and begin to live a new

life with God. After his Resurrection, Jesus met with the Apostles and gave them the commission to preach the Gospel and baptize, telling them, "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved" (Mk 16:16).

Confirmation, together with Baptism and Eucharist, form the Sacraments of Initiation that are all intimately connected. In the Sacrament of

Confirmation, the baptized person is "sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit" and is strengthened for service to the Body of Christ.

Those who believed in the Apostles' preaching were baptized and received the Holy Spirit through the laying on of hands. The Apostles baptized believers in water and the Spirit. Then they imparted the special gift of

the Spirit through the laying on of hands. "'The imposition of hands is rightly recognized by the Catholic tradition as the origin of the sacrament of Confirmation, which in a certain way perpetuates the grace of Pentecost in the Church'" (CCC, no. 1288)

By the second century, Confirmation was also conferred by anointing with holy oil, which came to be called sacred Chrism. "This anointing highlights the name 'Christian,' which means 'anointed' and derives from that of Christ himself whom God 'anointed with the Holy Spirit'" (CCC, no. 1289)

Our parish celebrates the liturgy of Confirmation each spring. In the years prior to being confirmed, our seventh grade school students and CCD / PREP children prepare for this significant moment in their faith life by regularly attending religious education classes and church. In the fall of seventh grade,

students announce their candidacy for Confirmation and begin a formal period of preparation.

Note: Any seventh grade student attending a private Catholic school should contact Mrs. Susan Angelo at 215-955-4795. These students should participate in our Rites of Candidacy, Election, retreat, practice days, etc. Any high school students who wish to be confirmed should contact the rectory. Any adult who has not been confirmed should contact Msgr. Grous, Pastor, at the rectory.

Confirmation

Holy Eucharist

So rich is the mystery of the **Eucharist** that we have a number of terms to illumine its saving grace: the Breaking of the Bread; the Lord's Supper; the Eucharistic Assembly; the Memorial of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection; the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the Holy and Divine Liturgy; the Eucharistic Liturgy; Holy Communion; and Holy Mass (cf. CCC, nos. 1328-1332).

The use of bread and wine in worship is already found in the early history of God's people. These ancient rituals were given historical meaning at the Exodus of God's people - united into the Passover Meal as a sign of God's delivering the Israelites from slavery in



Egypt, a pledge of his fidelity to his promises and eventually a sign of the coming of the Messiah and messianic times. Each family shared the lamb that had been sacrificed and the bread over which a blessing had been proclaimed. They also drank from a cup of wine over which a similar blessing had been proclaimed.

When Jesus instituted the Eucharist he gave a final meaning to the blessing of the bread and the wine and the sacrifice of the lamb. The Gospels narrate events that anticipated the Eucharist. The miracle of the loaves and fish, reported in all four Gospels, prefigured the unique abundance of the Eucharist. The miracle of changing water into wine at the wedding feast in Cana manifested the divine glory of Jesus and the heavenly wedding feast in which we share at every Eucharist. In his dialogue with the people at Capernaum, Christ used his miracle of multiplying the loaves of bread as the occasion to describe himself as the Bread of Life: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. . . Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you" (Jn 6:51, 53).

Traditionally, our parish second grade school children and CCD / PREP students prepare to receive Holy Eucharist usually on the first Saturday in May. Both parents and children make a commitment in the fall to prepare fully for this important time in their lives. Children enrolled in private Catholic elementary school or home schooled children should contact the rectory for additional information.

Reconciliation

The Sacrament of **Reconciliation** is an experience of the gift of God's boundless mercy. Not only does it free us from our sins but it also challenges us to have the same kind of compassion and forgiveness for those who sin against us. We are liberated to be forgivers. Jesus entrusted the ministry of reconciliation to the Church.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is God's gift to us so that any sin committed after Baptism can be forgiven. In confession we have the opportunity to repent and recover the grace of friendship with God. It is a holy moment in which we place ourselves in his presence and honestly acknowledge our sins, especially mortal sins. With absolution, we are reconciled to God and the Church. The Sacrament helps us stay close to the truth that we cannot live without God. "In him we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). While all the Sacraments bring us an experience of the mercy that comes from Christ's dying and rising, it is the Sacrament of Reconciliation that is the unique Sacrament of mercy.

Anointing of the Sick

The Rite of Anointing tells us there is no need to wait

until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament. A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient. The Sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after the anointing but becomes ill once again, or if, during the same illness, the person's condition becomes more serious. A person should be anointed before surgery when a dangerous illness is the reason for the intervention (cf. Rite of Anointing, Introduction, nos. 8-10).

Moreover, "old people may be anointed if they are in weak condition even though no dangerous illness is present. Sick children may be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be comforted by this sacrament. . . . [The faithful] should be encouraged to ask for the anointing, and, as soon as the time for the anointing comes, to receive it with faith and devotion, not misusing the sacrament by putting it off" (Rite of Anointing, nos. 11, 12, 13).

Only bishops and priests may be ministers of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. A penitential rite followed by the Liturgy of the Word opens the celebration. Scripture awakens the faith of the sick and family members and friends to pray to Christ for the strength of his Holy Spirit. The priest lays his hands on the head of the sick person. He then proceeds to anoint, with the blessed Oil of the Sick, the forehead and hands of the sick person (in the Roman Rite). He accompanies these acts with the words, "Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up" (CCC, no. 1513).

For those who are about to depart from this life, the Church offers the person Penance, Anointing of the Sick, and the Eucharist as Viaticum (food for the journey) given at the end of life. These are "the sacraments that prepare for our heavenly homeland" (cf. CCC, no. 1525). These rites are highly valued by Catholics as powerful aids to a good death. Since Holy Communion is the effective sign of Christ's Paschal Mystery, it becomes for the recipient the opportunity to unite one's own suffering and dying to that of Christ with the

hope of life eternal with him. The special words proper to Viaticum are added: "May the Lord Jesus protect you and lead you to everlasting life. Amen."

Please notify the rectory when a parishioner is confined to the home due to sickness, infirmity or age. Extraordinary Ministers will visit and bring Holy Communion to shut-ins on a weekly basis at the request of the parishioner. Monsignor makes bimonthly calls to shutins. The rectory staff will call the day before Monsignor's visit to schedule a convenient time.

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is administered in church after the 10:00 am Sunday Mass before the altar of Our Blessed Mother. The sick will be anointed before admission to a hospital; the elderly because of a weakened or disabling condition; and all whose illness shows a need for strengthening through the power of the Holy Spirit and the prayers of the Church. Please gather before Our Lady's altar directly after the 10:00 am Mass each Sunday.



Matrimony

Sacred Scripture begins with the creation and union of man and woman and ends with "the wedding feast of the Lamb" (Rev 19:7, 9). Scripture often refers to marriage, its origin and purpose, the meaning God gave to it, and its renewal in the covenant made by Jesus with his Church.

God created man and woman out of love and commanded them to imitate his love in their relations with each other. Man and woman were created for each other. "It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make a suitable partner for him. . . . The two of them become one body" (Gn 2:18; 24). Woman and man are equal in human dignity, and in marriage both are united in an unbreakable bond.

Jesus brought to full awareness the divine plan for marriage. In John's Gospel, Christ's first miracle occurs at the wedding in Cana. "The Church attaches great importance to Jesus' presence at the wedding at Cana. She sees in it the confirmation of the goodness of marriage and the proclamation that thenceforth marriage will be an efficacious sign of Christ's presence" (CCC, no. 1613).



By their marriage, the couple witnesses Christ's spousal love

for the Church. One of the Nuptial Blessings in the liturgical celebration of marriage refers to this in saying, "Father, you have made the union of man and wife so holy a mystery that it symbolizes the marriage of Christ and his Church."

The Sacrament of Marriage is a covenant, which is more than a contract. Covenant always expresses a relationship between persons. The marriage covenant refers to the relationship between the husband and wife, a permanent union of persons capable of knowing and loving each other and God. The celebration of marriage is also a liturgical act, appropriately held in a public liturgy at church. Catholics are urged to celebrate their marriage within the Eucharistic Liturgy.

To assist couples in their preparation for Christian marriage, the priest must be notified as soon as possible after you become engaged. Marriage preparation usually takes 12-15 months from a couple's engagement to the desired wedding date. Couples considering marriage should contact the rectory to make an appointment with Monsignor Grous and to set the date for the wedding.

Pre-Cana (Pre-Marital) Program or Engagement Encounter: The Church earnestly desires to assist engaged couples in strengthening their relationship. This is usually accomplished by learning about and discussing topics which promote a lasting commitment. The program covers communication skills, decision making on the use of time and money, lifestyle adjustments, and spirituality.

Weddings: Weddings are scheduled on Saturday at 12:00 noon and 2:00 pm. Arrangements can be made for a Friday evening wedding at 6:00 pm, except during Lent. Visiting priests are welcome. Contact the rectory office for additional details.

Those who receive the sacrament of Holy Orders -- as a deacon, priest or bishop -- are consecrated in Christ's name "to feed the Church by the word and grace of God."

Any man of the parish who has an interest in serving as a priest for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia should stop by the rectory to talk to Msgr. Grous. Any man, single or married over the age of 35, who has an interest in becoming a permanent deacon may make an appointment with Deacon Verna or write to: Office of Permanent Diaconate, St. Charles Borromeo Seminary-Overbrook, Wynnewood, PA 19096. Anyone interested in learning more about a calling to the priesthood, diaconate or religious life should speak with Msgr. Grous.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (R.C.I.A.) is a process of

instruction, prayer and faith sharing in a group that leads a participant into full communion with the Catholic Church.

R.C.I.A. Catechumens and Candidates: Participants include any adult who has never been baptized; people of another faith or church; any baptized but not confirmed individual; and/or any adult who has not celebrated their first communion are invited to participate.

Normal Meeting Schedule: Monday at 7:30 pm from October to April. The time commitment for instructors is two hours every Monday evening during the months previously mentioned, as well as preparation time.

Letters of Eligibility - Godparents & Sponsors

Godparents - Parents may obtain all the necessary forms and the <u>Baptism Guidelines and Instructions for</u> <u>the Godparents</u> at the Baptism (Pre-Jordan) class. It is wise to attend the Baptism class as early as possibleeven before the child is born. If you have previously attended the Pre-Jordan class (within the past three years), please telephone one of the priests to obtain all the forms, guidelines, and instructions. The Pre-Jordan class is held on the 3rd Sunday of the month at 10:00 am in the St. Katharine Drexel Conference Room (1st Floor of the Fr. John Hughes Building).

The purpose of the Pre-Jordan program is to assist parents in celebrating the Baptism of their child and to give them insight into the child's spiritual care and training. With the completion of all documents, parents may make final arrangements by telephoning one of the parish priests. Arrangements may also be made for a visiting priest or deacon to baptize a child at times convenient to the family and when the church is available.

Confirmation Sponsor - Since the role of the Confirmation sponsor is to provide witness and support to the candidate, the church recommends that a Baptismal Godparent be the Confirmation sponsor. However, other sponsors (except parents) meeting the below qualifications are permissible.

Godparents or Confirmation Sponsors must obtain a Letter (Certificate) of Eligibility from their parish priest attesting to the fact that they qualify to be a Godparent / Sponsor. To qualify as a Godparent or Confirmation Sponsor, a person must:

- 1. Be at least 16 years of age
- 2. Have received their First Communion and Confirmation
- 3. Attend weekly Mass
- 4. Receive the Eucharist and Reconciliation (Confession) often
- 5. Live in conformity with the teachings of the Catholic faith
- 6. If married, must be married according to the rite of the Roman Catholic Church

Occasionally, a person presents him/herself seeking a Letter and leaves upset because they were told that they did not meet the necessary requirements. This, at times, becomes a point of consternation and a cause of anger toward the Church, and even at the priest.

The role of Godparent/Sponsor is more than merely ceremonial and certainly more than the above requirements. It is a call to **PERSONAL INTEGRITY!** The first question, therefore, is not whether or not the Church will allow me to be a Godparent/Sponsor, but whether or not I can allow **MYSELF** to be one! In other words, each one of us must ask him/herself if his/her own personal integrity allows us to stand at the Altar and make a public profession that the Faith we speak in word is also the faith we practice.

Do understand that the role of Godparent/Sponsor does not demand that anyone of us be perfect or even a canonized saint; all of us must place ourselves within the mercy of God. It happens that people who have stopped attending Holy Mass or rarely receive the Sacraments suddenly find themselves asked to be a Godparent/Sponsor. In that situation the person has three options: 1) it can be received as a genuine grace-filled moment of conversion, that assuming the responsibility for another person's faith, I am ready to Renew my own faith and recommit myself to its practice; 2) it can make me realize that I am not quite ready to assume responsibility for another person's faith, when I have failed to be accountable for my own Baptismal promises, in which I case I would have to honestly turn down the request; or God forbid, 3) it can be a moment in which I do not take seriously the Sacrament, the responsibility or the gravity of my promise and violate my integrity by swearing to do something I was never willing to practice.

Respect for the right of persons to make their own personal choices even when they go against what the Church teaches and are not going to change the decision, is often expected from the Church. However, that same respect must be shown toward the Church without the expectation that the Church is going to change her teaching.

Pre-Cana

Marriage preparation – commonly referred to as pre-Cana - is a time of preparation for the wedding day, and every day after. It is a time of meditating on the meaning of the Sacramental union, and what difference inviting Christ into your marriage and your lives makes. This process is designed to help the engaged couple grow closer to God and each other, and to come to a deeper understanding of the sacrament of marriage, into which a couple will soon enter. The Church earnestly desires to assist engaged couples in strengthening their relationship by learning about and discussing topics which promote a lasting commitment. Marriage preparation programs cover such topics as communication skills, decision-making on the use of time and money, lifestyles, marital adjustments, sexuality, and spirituality.

The Archdiocese of Philadelphia offers "The Joy-Filled Marriage" program for engaged couples, designed to introduce them to the rich and engaging teachings of the Church on the sacrament of Matrimony, including the truth and meaning of human sexuality. As part of the course, couples are offered virtue-based instruction in communication, conflict resolution, and financial decision-making. The program assists couples contemplating marriage to discern their commitment to the sacramental bond, as taught by the church, and to provide guidance in preparing for their new vocation. It offers practical advice that will equip couples for their life journey together.



Couples should register for "The Joy-Filled Marriage" soon after their engagement to allow ample time to complete the program no later than 6-12 months prior to their wedding day. Couples may choose between a live online course and a self-paced course. Both options satisfy the marriage preparation requirements of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. *Until further notice, all marriage preparation programs are offered online only.* Visit PhillyCatholicMarriagePrep.com to register or call the Rectory office (610-259-1169) for more information.

Funeral Mass & Arrangements

The death of a loved one is a most sacred and sensitive time for family, relatives, and friends. When a family member passes away, the designated person contacts the Funeral Director to arrange the details of the funeral. The Funeral Director will make all the initial arrangements with St. Andrew Church for the Funeral Mass after consultation with the family. Once the Funeral Director schedules the Funeral Mass, members of the family are requested to come to the Rectory for the planning of the Funeral Mass (readings, music, etc.).

Please Note: If the family would like to share words of remembrance (eulogy) about the deceased, they may do so at the Funeral Home, the gravesite or the luncheon. St. Andrew Parish does not to permit words of remembrance / eulogies in the church at any time.


Ministers of Hospitality

Eucharistic Adoration


Our church is open on weekdays from the first morning Mass to 5:00 pm; Saturdays from 7:30 am to 6:00 pm and Sundays from 7:15 am to 1:30 pm.

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

During the Mass, the priest (during the consecration) speaks these words as he holds the communion host, "...*He took bread and gave you thanks. He broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said: Take this all of you, and eat it: this is my body which will be given up for you". When the priest says "this my body", it is at that instant when, through the miracle of transubstantiation, the bread and wine which we offer as the bloodless sacrifice to our Lord truly become the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus. It is His true Presence in the form of bread and wine. It is Christ.*

What do you actually do during adoration?

You may sign up to be an "*adorer*" which allows you to schedule yourself for one (or more) hour per week to pray before the very presence of Our Lord, exposed in the monstrance. It means that you can have some time alone with Jesus to recite your favorite prayers, read the bible, contemplate acts of faith, hope, charity, thanksgiving, reparation, pray a rosary or do whatever type of prayerful devotion that suits you before Our Lord. You can just sit and say nothing simply keeping Him company, just as you would with a dear friend.

St. Andrew Elder Care Ministry provides supportive services to older adults, their support persons, and the community at large.

Services provided by the Elder Care Ministry include care management, which includes an assessment of needs, development of a care plan detailing options to meet those needs, coordination of services, and follow up. Secondly, brief services can be provided in-person to assist with a particular need or concern. Lastly, information and referral services can be provided via phone to the community at large to provide needed resource information.



The Elder Care Ministry's core services include needs assessments, counseling, coordination of services, information and referrals, and advocacy.

The Elder Care Ministry continued to provide services to seniors during the pandemic. Some of the services provided or coordinated during this fiscal year included:



Scrip

The parish buys gift certificates (scrip) from various food and department stores, at a discount of 5% off the face value of the certificate. We sell the certificates to parishioners at face value. This is a dollar-for-dollar exchange. It does not <u>cost</u> you any extra money to buy scrip, but buying scrip can help <u>save</u> you money on registration fees and tuition.

Participating Merchants: ACME, Giant, ShopRite, and Kohl's. Scrip can be used to pay for prescriptions at ACME. You can use scrip to pay your Kohl's charge account. Giant scrip can be used for gas purchases at Giant. All scrip cards can be used out-of-state (i.e. at the shore) since the stores are all national chains.

Profit Distribution: When you purchase scrip, there are three options for profit distribution:

Option I -5% of the total back to the parish

Option II -2% back to the parish and 3% in fee/tuition credits for your family

Option III – 2% back to the parish and 3% in fee/tuition credits for <u>a family you designate</u>. This option allows grandparents and other family members to help offset fees and tuition costs. Or you can be a Good Samaritan and ask the scrip seller to assign the credits to a family in need.

Registration fee and Tuition Credits: Scrip credits may be used for Saint Andrew School, St. Andrew parish CCD / PREP, any Archdiocesan high school, and Holy Child Academy. We keep track of the credits earned by each family and make payment on your behalf. You will be notified of the amount credited so that you can reduce you fee/tuition payment accordingly. Saint Andrew School credits are applied to the registration fee and/or tuition in February. CCD / PREP credits are applied to the registration fee in September. High school and Holy Child Academy credits are issued in March. Credit can be carried over from year to year and applied to tuition at a later date (i.e. when a child moves from elementary to high school).

Purchasing Information: You may purchase scrip at the Rectory, during regular office hours. When purchasing scrip, please specify the last name of the family to be credited, as well as the student's name and her/his school.

For the past 21 years, the parish has provided an Annual Stewardship Report to our parish community. It has served as a ministry guide; a thank you for all our volunteers; a valuable directory of services; an overview of the sacraments, the Church's teaching and sponsorship eligibility requirements; an accounting of your financial support; and a heartfelt thank you for making this all possible.


We often take things for granted and assume institutions will always be there to serve our family's needs – generation after generation. Unfortunately, that has not been the case for many parishes and their parish schools throughout the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Ten years ago, there were 156 elementary schools in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Today that number is now 107 – that's 49 fewer elementary schools – a 31% drop in just 10 years.

Therefore, it is with great joy and profound gratitude to our parish community that we celebrate the Centennial Anniversary of Saint Andrew School. Despite some doubts by those who served on the special Archdiocesan Blue Ribbon Commission, we prevailed in our appeal to remain a parish school and have gone on to demonstrate successes in virtually all the major critical benchmarks for a successful elementary school operation (see pages 23, 45 & 46 and the photo collages throughout this report). SAS is among the top Catholic elementary schools in Delaware County with an enrollment of 441 students.

Yet simply achieving measurable results is not the primary mission of Saint Andrew School. The true mission is:

- to guide students in the understanding that they were created by God to provide loving service throughout their lives by sharing their innate gifts and talents with others in accordance with the Gospel message.
- to create successful learners by building positive, collaborative relationships among students, educators and families in a Christ-centered community and develop well-rounded learners who accept everyday challenges and embrace life's opportunities.

It's difficult to measure the impact our clergy, administration, faculty, Sisters of St. Joseph and the Home & School Association volunteers have had on our students and their families over the years. Yet, judging from the uncommon bonds that develop during those important formative years as witnessed by regular class reunions of our SAS alumni, lives have indeed been touched and the faith has been passed on to the next generation.



According to *Ecclesia in America*,

"It is essential that every possible effort be made to ensure that Catholic schools, despite financial difficulties, continue to provide a Catholic education to the poor and marginalized in society. It will never be possible to free the needy from their poverty unless they are first freed from the impoverishment arising from the lack of adequate education." (no. 71)


















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
